


# Introduction to Tutorials

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## What are Tutorials?

Tutorials are digital resources that give students hands-on **practice** for **building skills** in a **low-stakes** environment.

Topics covered in tutorials are broken down into smaller parts that allow students to progress, step by step, through different activities to gain more exposure to the material. This is one example of the steps you will follow in a tutorial:



You will always receive a completion grade of 100% when you finish a tutorial activity, but keep in mind the purpose of a tutorial is for you to get more exposure to the material by building skills through practice. Despite the automatic grade given, your instructors can choose to adjust that grade. Students are notified at the start of the tutorial that their instructor may do so.
